SCOOTER'S COFFEE FRISCO BOWL

DECEMBER 17, 2022 | 8:15 P.M. CT, TOYOTA STADIUM, FRISCO, TX | TV: ESPN

Last time the UTSA Roadrunners were seen at the Scooter's Coffee Frisco Bowl, quarterback Frank Harris was only in his fifth year of college. Only.

Now a seventh-year senior – yes, that's right – Harris and UTSA have sights set on their first bowl victory (0-4) in five tries. The Roadrunners (8-4) will return to Frisco to face former Conference USA foe Marshall (6-6) on December 19 at Toyota Stadium. Kickoff is set for 8 p.m. (CT) on ESPN.

UTSA joined and finished third in the American Athletic Conference this season. Harris and fourth-year coach Jeff Traylor (38-14) are synonymous with UTSA, which is 39-13 with Harris under center. UTSA has played football only 12 seasons, with Harris there for seven of them.

They'll be a seasoned duo against Marshall, making its 10th bowl appearance in the past 11 years.

"When you make a bowl 10 of the last 11 years, that's incredible," Traylor said. "That's where we want to get to here at UTSA."

Where UTSA is now is no slouch, and keeping Harris this long has been transformative. He signed with UTSA in 2017 from Schertz Clemens, and the next seven years went something like this:

Knee injuries (both ACLs) and surgeries, redshirted (twice), starting debut in 2019, lasted three games (shoulder), more surgery, COVID season and added-year exemption, 23-5 run next two years and two C-USA titles, more knee surgery last off-season, decision to return for seventh year.

Along the way, Harris gave his mind (two degrees) and body (see above) to UTSA and its football program. He's one of San Antonio's most recognized and beloved citizens, idolized by thousands of kids in their No. 0 Harris jerseys.

His final-game career numbers are monstrous, with nearly 12,000 yards and 92 touchdowns passing, and 2,100 yards and 28 TDs rushing.

"Frank has done so much for UTSA and San Antonio because his love for his teammates, our university and the city is genuine," Traylor said. "He's been a joy to coach in my four years here, and I hope we can send him and all of our seniors off on the right foot at the bowl game. We always have a chance when No. 0 is back there under center."

Like Harris, UTSA has similarly held onto Traylor, a seamless fit of a coach with eight years left on a 10-year contract. While navigating the NIL era of college football that never favors resource-thin Group of Five schools, Traylor is an unyielding advocate for capital improvements and other fundraising that give UTSA a fighting chance against college football's haves.

"We've had a lot of success," Traylor said. "There's a lot of people that want to talk to us about that success – how is it happening, why is it happening. As long as we're winning, that's going to continue, but we still have stuff to do here."

Bowl win No. 1 is front burner, as well as reaching a New Year's Six Bowl. UTSA came close in 2021, going 12-2. Marshall, now in the Sun Belt Conference, likely won't make it easy with 1,000-yard rusher Rasheen Ali (14 TDs) and six receivers with 20 or more catches.

"Coach Traylor has done a really good job with that program," Marshall coach Charles Huff said. "They played us really well in Conference USA. (Harris) has done a phenomenal job. With his experience and amount of years, it shows on the field. He has command of that team, and they listen to him. That's the kind of kid you want on any team."

Harris' favorite target, wideout Joshua Cephus, has 82 catches for 1,049 yards and nine TDs this season. Running back Robert Henry has nine rushing TDs, while safety Rashad Wisdom leads the defense with 58 tackles, (47 solo).

BRAD D. SMITH // MARSHALL PRESIDENT

Brad D. Smith became the 38th president of Marshall University in January 2022.

As a proud West Virginian with a passion for leadership and philanthropy, Brad D. Smith is focused on helping facilitate change by developing, supporting and investing in people. His devotion to giving back to his home state runs deep, and he is committed to providing educational and economic development resources to the Appalachian region, where many communities have been disproportionately affected by technological and economic change.

During Brad's 11-year tenure as CEO of Intuit, he was able to transform the company's business structure from a North American desktop software company to a global cloud-based platform with a portfolio that included TurboTax, QuickBooks and Mint. The transformation was born from an innovation culture built around data-driven decision-making and rapid experimentation. The drive to innovate across all layers of the company transformed the way Intuit was able to serve its consumers, small businesses and partners. This led to record growth that nearly doubled the company's revenues and increased its stock price more than 500%, and positioned Intuit as the industry leader.

Under his leadership, the company consistently was recognized as one of the world's best places to work. Intuit placed on the Fortune Best Companies

to Work For list each year during his tenure, ranking #13 in the United States and #1 in India, Singapore and Canada in 2017.

In 2016, Brad was ranked among the top CEOs in the United States by Fortune Magazine coming in at #6 on their list.

Before his time at Intuit, Brad's career spanned four industries, including stints at PepsiCo, 7-UP, ADVO and ADP, where he led large, global organizations through turn-around, transformation and high-growth environments.

He has served as the executive chairman of the board of Intuit, as chairman of the Nordstrom board and as a board member of Momentive (formerly SurveyMonkey) and Yahoo.

Brad's Wing 2 Wing Foundation, which he co-founded with his wife Alys, provides increased access and support for education, entrepreneurship mentoring and investment and works to position West Virginia "as a showcase for the nation." One of the foundation's signature initiatives is Ascend West Virginia, the nation's premier remote workforce recruitment program.

Originally from Kenova, Brad earned his bachelor's degree in business administration from Marshall University and his master's degree in management from Aquinas College in Grand Rapids, Michigan.

Brad and Alys are the parents of two grown daughters, Payton and Devon.

CHARLES HUFF

HEAD COACH // MARSHALL

3RD YEAR // 22-16 // HAMPTON '05

Marshall head coach Charles Huff is in his third season leading the Thundering Herd. The Herd has advanced to a bowl game in each of Huff's three seasons at the helm and he has compiled a 22-16 record since arriving in Huntington.

Huff led Marshall to a 9-4 record in 2022, which included a 26-21 win on the road at No. 8 Notre Dame – the team's first win over a top-10 team since 2003. Huff also navigated the Thundering Herd to a five-game winning streak at the end of 2022, which is one of the nation's longest heading into the 2023 season. The 2022 season culminated with a 28-14 win over UConn in the Myrtle Beach Bowl.

In Huff's inaugural season in Huntington, Marshall finished 7-6 while going to its 17th bowl appearance since moving up to FBS in 1997.

Charles Huff was named Marshall's head football coach on January 17, 2021.

An elite recruiter and developer of talent, Huff's proven track record bolstered head coach Nick Saban's staff for the 2019 and 2020 seasons.

In his inaugural season in Tuscaloosa, Huff helped Najee Harris rush for a career-best 1,224 yards on 209 carries with 13 rushing touchdowns while catching 27 passes for 304 yards and seven more scores. In 2020, Harris was a consensus All-American who led the nation in total touchdowns (30), rushing touchdowns (26) and points (180). He also ranked third nationally in rushing yards (1,466) and holds the school record for total touchdowns (57), rushing touchdowns (46) and rushing yards (3,843).

Huff arrived in Tuscaloosa after one season (2018) as the assistant head coach, run-game coordinator and running backs coach at Mississippi State. He boasts 16 years of coaching experience on both the NFL and college levels with stops at Penn State (2014-17), Western Michigan (2013), the Buffalo Bills (2012), Vanderbilt (2011), Hampton (2010), Maryland (2009) and Tennessee State (2006-08).

His one season in Starkville produced an effective rushing attack that averaged 223.6 yards per game to rank second in the SEC and 20th nationally.

A native of Denton, Maryland, Huff spent four seasons (2014-17) as Penn State's running backs coach and special teams coordinator. He recruited and developed one of the game's most electrifying players in running back Saquon Barkley, who was drafted by the New York Giants as the No. 2 overall pick in the 2018 draft.

Numerous records fell at the running back position and on special teams under Huff's guidance at Penn State. Barkley, a 2017 consensus All-American, became the first Big Ten running back in history to win Offensive Player of the Year honors twice. A Walter Camp National Player of the Year finalist, Barkley ranked second nationally in all-purpose yards in 2017 (2,329). He broke four school career records, including rushing touchdowns (43), total touchdowns (53), all-purpose yards (5,538) and consecutive games with a touchdown (15) in just three seasons.

He spent the 2013 season at Western Michigan as the running backs coach and helped the unit nearly double its rushing yards from 2012. The Broncos ran for 1,394 yards in 2013 after running for just 735 yards the year before.

Huff spent the 2012 season in the NFL as the assistant running backs coach for the Buffalo Bills. He helped C.J. Spiller to his first career 1,000-yard rushing campaign and a Pro Bowl invitation.

In 2011, Huff was on James Franklin's 2011 staff at Vanderbilt as the offensive quality control coach. Huff and Franklin also worked together at Maryland in 2009, when Huff was the assistant offensive line coach. Huff also mentored NFL first-round pick Dominique Rodgers-Cromartie as the tight ends and special teams coach at Tennessee State from 2007-08.

Huff graduated in 2005 from Hampton University where he served as a team captain, starting 12 games at center as a senior in 2005. He also played guard, fullback and tight end in his career.

Huff and his wife, Jessica, have two boys: B.J. and Beau. They are also expecting a third child in the coming months.

DR. LISA CAMPOS // UTSA VICE PRESIDENT FOR INTERCOLLEGIATE ATHLETICS

Introduced as UTSA's Vice President for Intercollegiate Athletics and Athletics Director on Nov. 17, 2017, Dr. Lisa Campos has made an immediate and positive impact on the athletics department, university and community during her time in San Antonio. One of five finalists for the 2022 Sports Business Journal's Athletic Director of the Year, Campos has elevated UTSA Athletics to new heights in her first five years leading the department, most recently leading the Roadrunners into the American Athletic Conference as of July 1, 2023.

One of Campos' first tasks upon her hiring was to develop and implement a new strategic plan for the future of UTSA Athletics and align with UTSA President Taylor Eighmy's vision and strategic initiatives for the university. Less than one year later, she introduced the Roadrunner Game Plan, which utilizes three winning values — Excellence, Integrity and Unity — to focus on developing and enhancing the student-athlete experience, creating a culture of excellence, developing resources and uniting the community. The plan's emphasis to develop champions in the classroom, in competition and in life has been evident during her tenure.

UTSA student-athletes have set numerous department records for academic success including achieving an 87% graduation success rate in the most recent report and currently boasting an average team GPA of 3.24 as of the Spring 2023 semester. Additionally, student-athletes have collected nearly 300 Conference USA Commissioner's academic medals and more than 1,000 C-USA Honor Roll certificates in the last five years.

Under her leadership, UTSA's sport programs have produced 25 All-Americans and six Academic All-Americans, as well as more than 175 all-conference honors and over 30 academic all-district accolades. The Roadrunners have captured six team championships — including back-to-back football titles in 2021-22 — and over three dozen individual conference crowns in the last five years.

Campos also worked closely with the Roadrunner Foundation and colleagues on campus to guide one of the most ambitious projects in the history of UTSA Athletics — the development of the new state-of-the-art Roadrunner Athletics Center of Excellence, which opened in August 2021. The \$40.8 million,

94,700-square-foot facility serves as the central hub for UTSA Athletics and promotes the academic success, health, wellness and performance of student-athletes.

In 2023, Park West Fieldhouse opened its doors to serve UTSA soccer and track & field student-athletes, as well as the San Antonio and Bexar County communities. The 14,325-square-foot building features space for an athletic training room, locker rooms, team areas and an equipment room.

In 2022 under Campos' direction, TPC San Antonio became the official home of the UTSA men's and women's golf teams. The resort houses two championship-level golf courses, study halls and team rooms for both programs, as well as The Learning Center, an instructional building equipped with the latest golf technology.

Campos has overseen the highest fundraising year in UTSA Athletics history, while also achieving the highest back-to-back fundraising years in department history.

Nationally, Campos has served on the NCAA Division I Council and as chair of the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Oversight Committee and NCAA Women's Soccer Committee. She also has served on the board of the LEAD1 Association and has been a member of the NCAA Division I Football Oversight Committee, NCAA Division I Championships/Competition Cabinet and NCAA Rifle Committee.

Campos came to UTSA after five years as the Vice President for Intercollegiate Athletics at Northern Arizona University (NAU), where she led the athletics department through a rebrand and transformed it into one of the Big Sky Conference's premier programs.

Prior to her time at NAU, Campos was an associate athletics director (2003-06) and senior associate athletics director (2006-12) at UTEP after serving as the university's assistant dean of students from 2001-03.

Campos earned both her bachelor's degree in business administration and her master's degree in student affairs in higher education from Colorado State. She holds a doctorate degree in educational leadership from UTEP.

She and her husband, Darren D'Attilio, have a son, Christopher.

JEFF TRAYLOR

HEAD COACH // UTSA

3RD YEAR // 30-10 // STEPHEN F. AUSTIN '90

Named UTSA's third head coach on Dec. 9, 2019, Jeff Traylor has had an immediate impact on the program, university and city of San Antonio in a short period of time.

Traylor has turned around the UTSA football program by instilling his 210 Triangle of Toughness culture, which has led to positive results on and off the field. The Gilmer, Texas, native took over a team that won a combined seven games in the two seasons prior to his arrival and has led the Roadrunners to a 38-14 record in his first four years, already the most wins and best winning percentage (.731) by a coach in program history.

UTSA has been even more successful in conference play in the Traylor era, as the Roadrunners have won two conference championships and are 29-4 (.879) against league competition, including a perfect 18-0 in conference home games.

This season, Traylor has guided the Roadrunners to an 8-4 overall record and a 7-1 league mark, good for third place in their debut season in the American Athletic Conference. UTSA will face Marshall in the Scooter's Coffee Frisco Bowl on Dec. 19 to mark the program's fourth straight and fifth overall bowl appearance.

A total of 16 Roadrunners were named All-American Athletic Conference this fall, including first-team honorees in Defensive Player of the Year and outside linebacker Trey Moore, cornerback Kam Alexander, wide receiver Joshua Cephus, quarterback Frank Harris and safety Rashad Wisdom.

Traylor has coached six All-Americans, three national award finalists, 83 all-conference honorees and a pair of NFL Draft picks during his time in San Antonio.

During his UTSA tenure, Traylor has twice been named Conference USA Coach of the Year and an Eddie Robinson Coach of the Year finalist. He was the 2021 AFCA Region 4 Coach of the Year and a finalist for the AFCA National Coach of the Year and George Munger College Coach of the Year that same year.

UTSA student-athletes have been honored for their work in the classroom under Traylor, as well. Ahofitu Maka became the third Roadrunner to be named a finalist for the William V. Campbell Trophy and the second to be selected as a College Sports Communicators (CSC) Academic All-American when he landed on the first team in 2022. He also earned spots on the CSC Academic All-District Team for a third time and the C-USA All-Academic Team for the second straight season. Hunter Duplessis was a two-time C-USA Football Scholar Athlete of the Year, a 2021 CSC Academic All-American, a two-time C-USA All-Academic Team selection and a two-time CSC Academic All-District pick. Lucas Dean earned 2021 C-USA All-Academic Team recognition and CSC Academic All-District Team accolades in 2021 and 2022.

Traylor has more than 30 years of coaching experience including a highly successful 15-year career as head coach at Gilmer High School, where he led teams to three state championships and two state runner-up finishes and won more than 87% of his games.

Traylor began his coaching career as an assistant coach at Big Sandy High School in 1990-93 before a seven-year stint (1994-2000) at Jacksonville High School where he served as passing coordinator, defensive backs coach, receivers coach and special teams coordinator.

Following his time leading the Gilmer program, he moved on to the college ranks. In 2015, he was the special teams coordinator and tight ends at Texas before being named associate head coach, offense and the receivers coach in 2016. He was the associate head coach and running back coach at both SMU (2017) and Arkansas (2018-19) before landing the UTSA head coaching job.

A 1986 graduate of Gilmer High School, Traylor earned both undergraduate (1990) and graduate (2002) degrees in education from Stephen F. Austin while playing football as a walk-on.

He and his wife, Cari, have three children: Jordan, Jacob and Jaci.
