MOUNTAINEERS TIGERS

First, a little trivia. Spotify's most-streamed vocalists in the U.S. for 2024 include -- at No. 5 -- a former Scooter's Coffee employee from her pre-superstar days. Yes, it's possible Chappell Roan once handed you a steaming Turtle Latte if you lived in Missouri.

As degrees of separation go, this pop music-to-college football one is loose at best. But, as one Chappell Roan mega-hit goes, this year's Scooter's Coffee Frisco Bowl is "Hot To Go."

No. 25 Memphis (10-2) and West Virginia (6-6) are set to kick off the 7th Frisco Bowl on December 17 at 8 p.m. (CST) at Toyota Stadium. ESPN will have the call. Scooter's Coffee is in its second year as the bowl's title sponsor.

The Tigers and Mountaineers might serve up one of the hotter matchups in Scooter's Coffee Frisco Bowl history. West Virginia (Big 12) is the first Power 4 conference participant in the event, while Memphis is the second-ranked one, following UTSA (No. 24) in 2021.

Memphis is making its 11th straight bowl appearance and knocked off another Big 12 opponent, Iowa State, in last year's AutoZone Liberty Bowl. West Virginia will make its 41st all-time bowl appearance and fourth in the past five years.

As college football moves into its postseason, a crowded calendar includes bowls, signing day and the opening of the transfer portal. Bowls now staged earlier on the schedule, such as the Frisco Bowl, can benefit from higher player participation with additional time before the portal closes on December 28.

"We were hoping to play in an earlier bowl game," West Virginia athletic director Wren Baker said. "With signing day and the portal open on the 9th (of December), our players are excited to stay together and play again. With a later game, the portal becomes a bigger factor. We have a chance for better participation."

Three Mountaineers were named to the All-Big 12 team, including senior offensive tackle Wyatt Milum, senior defensive end T.J. Jackson II, and freshman linebacker Josiah Trotter. The latter was named Big 12 Defensive Freshman of the Year.

Milum is an Outland Trophy (best interior lineman) semifinalist and hasn't allowed a sack the past two seasons. He's credited with helping WVU rank 9th in the FBS in rushing this season at 192.7 yards

per game. Jackson has 38 tackles this season after transferring from Troy, including 20 solo tackles, 6 1/2 sacks, and 13 1/2 tackles for losses.

WVU's defense, particularly in the secondary, should have its hands full with Memphis senior quarterback Seth Henigan. He'll be almost home in Frisco with friends and family in attendance, having played high school ball at nearby Denton Ryan High School. Frisco straddles the line between Collin and Denton Counties.

Henigan is 16 yards shy of throwing for 14,000 career yards, and is the American Conference's career passing yards leader. His 102 career touchdown passes make him one of three active FBS passers (Dillon Gabriel, Oregon; Will Rogers, Washington) with 100 career TDs. Memphis is 20-5 the past two seasons with Henigan taking snaps.

To its credit, Memphis knocked off Tulane 34-24 to end the regular season. Going in, Tulane had a two-game lead in the American standings and still advanced to the conference championship game, which Army won 35-14. Still, Memphis can cap its 2024 season with four consecutive victories.

"I'm very excited about the future of our program," Memphis coach Ryan Silverfield said on December 4 after signing 22 new recruits to a class ranked as the AAC's best.

"We're excited to be in Frisco against a great West Virginia team. What an awesome opportunity to be able to play on a national spotlight against a Power 4 team and see if we can find a way to get our 11th win of the season."

Losses to bowl teams Navy and UTSA kept Memphis from knocking at the College Football Playoff door this season and its new 12-team bracket.

"It's a great day to be a Memphis Tiger," Silverfield said. "I saw that we've been mentioned in the Top 25 for the College Football Playoff. That's great. It just means our name continues to come across that bottom line on a national stage."

Overcoming the physical, run-heavy Mountaineers would be a step in that direction for Memphis. As an early-winter chill sets in Texas, either team will gladly take a Scooter's Coffee Frisco Bowl victory, to go.

Hot, not iced, please.

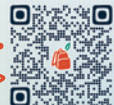

WEST VIRGINIA ATHLETICS

The Department of Intercollegiate Athletics at West Virginia University sponsors 18 varsity sports with more than 500 student-athletes competing in baseball, men's and women's basketball, women's cross country, football, men's golf, women's gymnastics, women's indoor and outdoor track, rifle, men's and women's soccer, men's and women's swimming and diving, women's tennis, women's volleyball, women's rowing and wrestling.

These sports compete in a variety of facilities. Mountaineer Field at Milan Puskar Stadium seats 60,000 fans, and is the home of Mountaineer football. The Evansdale campus sports complex includes a 14,000-seat WVU Coliseum, which is home to men's and women's basketball games, as well as events for women's gymnastics, women's volleyball and wrestling. Additional facilities in the complex include Dick Dlesk Soccer Stadium, the Coliseum Tennis Courts and the Shell Building, which houses the rifle range and indoor track. Non-event facilities in the complex include the basketball practice facility, which serves as the daily home to the men's and women's basketball offices and practice needs along with additional practice facilities in the men's soccer training facility, the women's soccer training facility, Cary Gym for gymnastics and the wrestling Pavilion. Just two miles from the Coliseum sports complex, and located in University Town Center, Kendrick Family Ballpark, which provides one of the best home venues in college baseball. The Peak Health Aquatic Center at Mylan Park and the Track and Field Complex at Mylan Park, located approximately three miles from the Coliseum, are the homes of the Mountaineer swimming and diving and track and field teams.

West Virginia University competes in the Big 12 Conference in all sports except men's soccer (Sun Belt Conference) and rifle (Great American Rifle Conference) and strives in its athletics program for national excellence and prominence. Accordingly, the recruitment of student-athletes and emphasis on and support of athletics are national in scope.

The Department of Intercollegiate Athletics subscribes to high standards of academic quality as well as breadth of academic opportunities. WVU's student-athletes consistently rank above the

national and Big 12 average in Academic Progress Rate (APR) and graduation rate.

Athletic success is also prominent at West Virginia. The football and men's basketball programs, in their respective sport, are among the Top 20 all-time winningest programs in the nation. Rifle has won more national championships (19) than any rifle program in the country and women's soccer played for the national championship in 2016. The athletic department continues to have national success in a Power 5 conference, ranking among the country's top programs in the all-sport Director's Cup listings. In 2017, West Virginia was ranked as the fifth-best athletic program in the country based on athletic success for that year.

The mission of the West Virginia University Department of Intercollegiate Athletics is to provide the means to empower student-athletes to develop as leaders and achieve their full potential academically, athletically and personally. As an integral part of WVU, the Department of Intercollegiate Athletics is committed to supporting the broader mission of the University through the integration of athletics in the academic community.

In achieving this mission, the defining principles are reflected in Mountaineer P.R.I.D.E.:

P – People – We will recognize that the foundation of WVU Athletics is the people – student-athletes, coaches, staff and the greater Mountaineer community.

CHAD SCOTT

INTERIM HEAD COACH WEST VIRGINIA



Chad Scott, in his second year as the offensive coordinator, is in his sixth year on the coaching staff at West Virginia. Scott was the co-offensive coordinator for his first three years, before serving as the run game coordinator in 2022, in addition to coaching the running backs all five years.

He was named interim head coach on Dec. 2, 2024.

In 2024, the WVU rushing offense was among the tops in the nation, ranking No. 9 among Power Four. The trio of Jahiem White, CJ Donaldson Jr. and Garrett Greene are one of two FBS backfields to each rush for more than 600 yards in the regular season. The offense produced 10 games of more than 140 yards rushing, five with more than 200 yards, including three of the past five games. Since 2022, the Mountaineers have produced 140 or more rushing yards in 26 of the last 28 games.

West Virginia finished with 2,976 rushing yards in 2023, ranking No. 1 among Power 5 schools. In Big 12 games, WVU was the only school to finish with more than 2,000 rushing yards (2,211). Among Power 5 schools, WVU has the longest streak of games with 140 or more rushing yards (16), three more than any other team. In Big 12 games, the Mountaineers led the league in rushing yards per game (245.67) and tied for No. 1 in rushing touchdowns (24).

In 2022, West Virginia's running game averaged 171.5 yards per game in 2022 as he built a strong unit of depth and consistency. Running backs Tony Mathis, Justin Johnson, CJ Donaldson and Jaylen Anderson combined for 1,793 yards and 18 touchdowns.

In 2021, running back Leddie Brown finished with more than 1,000 yards rushing for the second straight season (1,065) and finished with a team-high 14 offensive touchdowns.

In 2020, the Mountaineers had the most improved offense in the country in terms of total yards. Their running game improved production by more than 60 yards per game, more than 90 yards of total offense and almost seven points a game.

He came to WVU after serving as the tight ends and hybrids coach at North Carolina from 2016-18.

In 2016, Scott was part of an offensive staff that oversaw the establishment of more than 40 individual and team records, including passing yards and passing yards per game.

Scott returned to Chapel Hill after coaching at Kentucky, where he tutored running backs from 2013-15 and was the run-game coordinator in 2014-15.

He spent three seasons at Texas Tech from 2010-12. While the Red Raiders were known for throwing the ball, Scott's running backs made significant contributions to the offense. The Red Raiders rushed for 135.7 yards per game and scored 52 rushing touchdowns during his three seasons. TTU's primary running backs averaged 5.0 yards per attempt.

Scott earned his first full-time coaching job at Troy as an assistant coach for running backs from 2007-09, helping lead the Trojans to three consecutive Sun Belt Conference Championships and a pair of appearances in the New Orleans Bowl.

In each of Scott's first two seasons, he coached an All-Sun Belt Conference player in Kenny Cattouse and DuJuan Harris. Harris, who played in the NFL for seven years, ranked No. 2 in the conference in rushing in 2008 with 1,077 yards.

A native of Plant City, Florida, Scott began his collegiate playing career at Kentucky before transferring to North Carolina, where he lettered in 2003 and 2005. He earned first-team All-ACC honors from ESPN.com after rushing for 796 yards and eight touchdowns as a senior. Scott made his first career start as a Tar Heel against No. 4 Miami and rushed for a career-high 175 yards on 25 carries and scored twice in a 31-28 victory.

Scott spent time in the National Football League with the Cleveland Browns and Pittsburgh Steelers before returning to his alma mater in 2006 as a graduate assistant video analyst.

He graduated from UNC in 2004 with a degree in sociology. He is married to the former Shambria Jones, who played basketball at Kentucky. The couple has a daughter, Kori, and a son, Jakobe.

ABOUT MEMPHIS

The University of Memphis (UofM) was established in 1912 as the West Tennessee State Normal School, primarily focusing on training teachers. In 1925, the institution's name was changed to West Tennessee State Teachers College, reflecting its broader educational mission. The school continued to expand its academic programs and facilities during the 1920s and 1930s. The college became Memphis State College in 1941, signifying its transition to a more comprehensive institution offering a wider range of degree programs. During this period, the college grew significantly in enrollment and academic offerings. In 1957, the institution was granted university status, becoming Memphis State University and began offering graduate programs. The 1970s and 1980s were marked by further expansion in academic programs, research initiatives and campus facilities. The University established various research centers and institutes, contributing to its reputation as a major research institution. In 1994, Memphis State University was officially renamed the University of Memphis to better reflect its comprehensive mission and connection to the city.

Over the years, the UofM has continued to expand its academic programs, research



capabilities and campus infrastructure, and in December 2021 achieved Carnegie R1 status, the highest level of research activity designation. This recognition places the University among the top tier of research universities

in the United States. The achievement was the culmination of over 50 years of effort and strategic planning, significantly enhancing the University's research capabilities and reputation. The push for R1 status saw notable increases in research awards and faculty engagement. By 2021, the University had set a record with \$50.23 million in research awards, a substantial increase from previous years. The attainment of R1 status has attracted new partnerships and opportunities, bolstering the University's role in both the academic and local communities.

In Fall 2024, the UofM had a total enrollment of 20,276 students, including 15,770 undergraduates and 4,506 graduate students. The University offers a wide range of academic programs with students and faculty from all over the world. The campus boasts 25 Chairs of Excellence and five state-approved Centers of Excellence. It plays a significant role in the cultural, economic and social life in Memphis, the Mid-South region and beyond.

MEMPHIS ATHLETICS

The University of Memphis, a charter member of the American Athletic Conference, is home to over 400 student-athletes representing 17 intercollegiate sports.

Memphis Athletics is in the middle of renovations and new facility construction touching many of its programs. An extensive renovation was recently completed at Elma Roane Fieldhouse (women's basketball), a new Olympic Sports Weight Room was constructed, enhancements wrapped up at FedExPark Avron Fogelman Field (baseball) and the brand-new Leftwich Tennis Center was completed in November of 2023. Additionally, the Frederick W. Smith Family, headed by the founder of FedEx, has committed a \$50 million challenge gift (largest gift in UofM history) to the University of Memphis for renovations to Simmons Bank Liberty Stadium, where renovations began this past season.

Boasting one of the most recognizable brands in college athletics, Memphis is a consistent player on the national landscape. In 2023-24, football punched its ticket to the program's 10th-straight bowl appearance, men's soccer hosted and won its first-ever NCAA Tournament game, women's soccer

reached the NCAA Tournament Round of 16 for the second-straight year and men's tennis punched its ticket to the NCAA Tournament and earned its first win since 2021.

In addition to success on the playing fields, Memphis is committed to sustained success in the classroom and in the community. In 2023-24, Memphis posted a Graduation Success Rate of 92 percent with six programs recording a perfect 100 GSR, and 253 student-athletes earned AAC All-Academic Team honors. Memphis student-athletes completed over 4,600 hours of community service in 2023-24 and contributed an estimated economic impact of \$155,000 to Memphis and the surrounding regions.

Memphis' conference history in the modern era has also included stops in the Missouri Valley Conference, the Metro Conference, the Great Midwest Conference and Conference USA. Notable athletics alumni include Isaac Bruce, Stephen Gostkowski and DeAngelo Williams (football), Tyreke Evans, Anfernee "Penny" Hardaway and Derrick Rose (basketball) and Dan Uggla (baseball), among many others.

RYAN SILVERFIELD

HEAD COACH MEMPHIS



Ryan Silverfield became the 25th head coach in Memphis football history in December 2019 and began his tenure by leading the Tigers into their first major bowl game appearance: the Goodyear Cotton Bowl Classic in Dallas.

In naming Silverfield, the Tigers hired from within. Silverfield served as deputy head coach and offensive line coach during the 2019 season as the Tigers won their first outright conference title in 50 years. Memphis won the 2019 American Athletic Conference championship with a 29-24 win over Cincinnati at Liberty Bowl Memorial Stadium.

Silverfield also was part of Memphis staffs that led the program to three-straight American Athletic Conference West Division crowns from 2017-19 and four-straight bowl appearances from 2016-19. Behind Silverfield's contributions, Memphis won 38 games during those four seasons, including going 10-3 in 2017 and 12-1 in 2019. He is the only member of the staff to be part of both 10-plus win seasons.

Most recently, Silverfield led the Tigers to a 10-2 regular season in 2024 and secured back-to-back 10-win seasons for the first time in program history when he took Memphis on the road to knock off No. 17 Tulane, 34-24, on Thanksgiving Day. The double-digit win season is just the sixth in program history with a chance to win 11 games for just the second time in school history. In addition, the Tigers completed a perfect season at Simmons Bank Liberty Stadium, going undefeated at home (7-0) for the second time of Silverfield's tenure.

The Tigers were ranked in all three polls on Dec. 3, coming in at No. 24 in the US LBM Coaches Poll and No. 25 in the AP Poll and CFP Top 25 Rankings.

Silverfield led Memphis to what will be its 11th-consecutive bowl appearance in 2024 – the seventh-longest streak in the country and longest among non-Power 4 programs. Silverfield's 41 wins are the most of any coach in program history through five seasons, while those wins are third most nationally among head coaches hired in 2020.

Memphis' 41 wins with Silverfield at the helm are tied for 19th most in the nation over that stretch, while its 28 home wins over that period are tied for third-most in FBS.

The Tigers had 10 student-athletes earn All-AAC honors in 2024, the most for the team since 2019. Memphis led the league with seven First Team All-AAC selections: RB Mario Anderson Jr., WR Roc Taylor, OL Xavier Hill, TE Anthony Landphere, LB Chandler Martin, DB Davion Ross and DL William Whitlow Jr. The seven First Team honorees marked the most for Memphis since joining the American Athletic Conference in 2013.

The American's all-time leading passer Seth Henigan was named Third Team All-AAC Quarterback while offensive linemen Jonah Gambill and Trent Holler also earned Third Team accolades.

In 2023, Silverfield guided the Tigers to a 10-3 season, capped off by a dominant 36-26 win over Iowa State in the 65th Annual AutoZone Liberty Bowl in which the Tigers held the Cyclones to zero rushing yards. With the victory, Silverfield improved to 4-0 in bowl games and is the only head coach in program history with four bowl titles.

Under Silverfield's leadership in 2022, Memphis defeated Utah State, 38-10, in the SERVPRO First Responder Bowl, becoming the first head coach in program history to earn back-to-back bowl titles.

In 2021, Silverfield led the Tigers to a berth in the EasyPost Hawai'i Bowl, extending the team's bowl streak. Memphis was named EasyPost Hawai'i Bowl Champions after Hawai'i was unable to participate.

In his first full season at the helm of the program in 2020, Silverfield led the Tigers to the team's first bowl victory since 2014, a 25-10 win over Florida Atlantic in the Montgomery Bowl, becoming the first head coach in school history to win a bowl game in his first year.

Silverfield guided Memphis to an 8-3 record on the season, setting the program record for winning percentage (.727) by a first-year head coach, while also matching the school mark for most wins in a debut year (Mike Norvell, 2016). For his efforts, he was named the 2020 Tennessee Sports Writers Association (TSWA) Coach of the Year.

During his time as head coach, Silverfield has had six student-athletes selected in the NFL Draft and 36 earn All-AAC honors.
